Reflection

When Jesus ate with the tax collectors, he caused a stir throughout the city. Many were men of ill repute who abused their power over their fellow citizens by overcharging them and then lining their own pockets with the difference. The Pharisees reasoned that if Jesus were truly the Messiah, he would not seek out these vile men but would eat with the righteous instead. When the Pharisees confronted Jesus about this, he silenced them with a challenge to discover the true meaning of mercy, defined by his own example. Rather than wait for the unbeliever to come to church, Christ brought a living gospel to the doorstep of their homes.

The challenge is no less compelling today. Right outside the walls of your local church are people who are seeking answers. There are those who need healing, who are lonely, and who may even be reviled by others in their community. You have good medicine to dispense—a gospel message that heals hearts and changes lives and reconciles sinners to a merciful Savior.

PRAYER PROMPTS

- Prayerfully reflect on the lessons from Sunday’s worship service, the music (including our special guests, the Bethel University Women’s Chorale), Scripture, and Pastor Dave’s message “What Do I Do with Jesus?”* from Matthew 27. Pray for the leading of the Spirit in applying the lessons learned to your own life and as a witness to others.
- Pray for Evangel as we face significant challenges *and* opportunities. Pray specifically as we seek the Lord’s will for a clear vision for the days ahead as we pursue the possibility of the major ministry initiative mentioned above. More details on the process of evaluating this opportunity and formulating a vision and strategy for it (or any other option the Lord clearly directs us to) will begin coming soon. For now, please join us on Wednesday evenings to help produce a growing chorus of praise and intercession.
