Prayer for the Week

Reflection

This psalm, which contains praise to God for victory in battle and a question—Why should God stoop to help humanity since we are like a vapor and our days like a passing shadow?—also contains a prayer for the Lord to divinely intervene: “Bend down the heavens, Lord, and come down.” This cry for deliverance, a desire to be rescued from enemies and drawn out of deep waters, echoes throughout the Psalms. But the fact is, the Lord *did* bend down the heavens and come down when he became a baby born in Bethlehem. God gave his only begotten Son so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life. {This week}, on Christmas, join your voice with the praise of believers throughout history and around the world who celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, and give him thanks and worship for the sacrifice of his Son to heal and save us. Lift up your heart to the Lord who reached down, the One who cares for us though we are mere mortals and who loves us with an everlasting love.

PRAYER PROMPTS

- Prayerfully reflect on the lessons from Sunday’s worship service, the music, Scripture, and Pastor Dave’s message*, “What Child Is This?” (John 1:1,14) as he concludes with the fourth of this year’s Advent series. Pray for opportunities to apply the lessons of this series, other elements of the service, and the thoughts from this Touch Points as you go through this week.
- Continue to pray for our “Stepping Out in Faith” initiative: for the identification of a church planter, for unity and commitment as we seek to bring success to this evangelistic effort by growing ourselves. Pray for Mark Albrecht of Converge Mid-America as he seeks the Lord’s direction to find the best person for the Wheaton area—and for the recent contact Pastor Dave had with one potential planter in the area. In the meantime, take seriously Bill France’s challenge to pray that God will lead 25 adults and 50 children to Evangel—a seemingly impossible task! But not impossible for God! In fact, we have seen several new faces, including a recent growth in Coffeefreak that has not occurred in some time. Let’s ask the Lord to fill both sides of the sanctuary with people who are eager to worship and to be partners with God to reach those appointed to eternal life!
